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STATE OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD



Hello neighbors! What a trip... but we made it through 2020. As I've mentioned in past newsletters, our neighborhood has been undergoing a lot of change over the past few years. The various new strains that Covid levied on our neighborhood was a new storm to weather and navigate together. I'm happy to say, despite an even greater amount of change than we anticipated, we've managed to not sink the ship and have learned a few new tricks along the way that will make us stronger.

Personally, as I reflect over the past two years as president of this neighborhood association, I've had to learn how to go from the person who can get the task done to the person who can motivate others to want to do their own tasks. This is not a simple thing to do since everyone's motivations are so different.

Initially, I thought the president's job was to charter a list of to-dos for a bunch of initiatives and projects that I wanted our neighborhood to get done. It turns out that's actually pretty presumptuous, and to flow down direction in a volunteer organization does not garner the support of the team you'll rely on to see the projects through. I've had to instead learn how to focus people's natural "will to do things" within our neighborhood, and make those people feel supported and empowered to do their thing. It felt weird sometimes not being responsible for generating the great ideas, but being able to witness the sparks come from the team and supporting them however I could gave me a new perspective on my role. I found that the leader's job is to have a conversation about important topics and initiatives with the organization, and then to be the champion of the resulting projects or initiatives, and help where needed (if I'm even needed at all).

In general, I try to leave things better than I found them. Taking on this neighborhood in that regard has been a very tall order since it was pretty great to begin with. Still, the changes we've made over the past two years have been impressive; we've set ourselves up to be financially sustainable (even through a pandemic!), we've made tremendous improvements to our Expanded Neighborhood Patrol (ENP), we've updated our neighborhood association's bylaws for the first time in over 25 years, we've made major changes to improve our Home Tour Weekend activities, and

perhaps most importantly we've placed a much larger emphasis on our communication via email and on social media to make sure as many people can join the conversation as possible. These changes all happened because people who care about this neighborhood got the idea and wanted them to happen, and then made them happen - not because one person told them to do it.

The purpose of the HSMNA is to connect all of our neighbors and make this neighborhood a better place to live, whether you are a dues-paying member or not. We want you to love this place as much as the fanatics that serve on our board and many others off the board do - and if you don't support us currently, we hope we can win you over eventually (you can join us by visiting hsmna.org). Especially through this pandemic, I literally cannot imagine living anywhere else. The support Elisabeth and I have seen from our friends in this neighborhood, who are more so family at this point, simply does not exist anywhere else.

I look forward to another great year of progress in our fair burg as we continue making changes that will move us in the direction we need to go, all thanks to the people who have the energy and passion to make our neighborhood even more treasured.

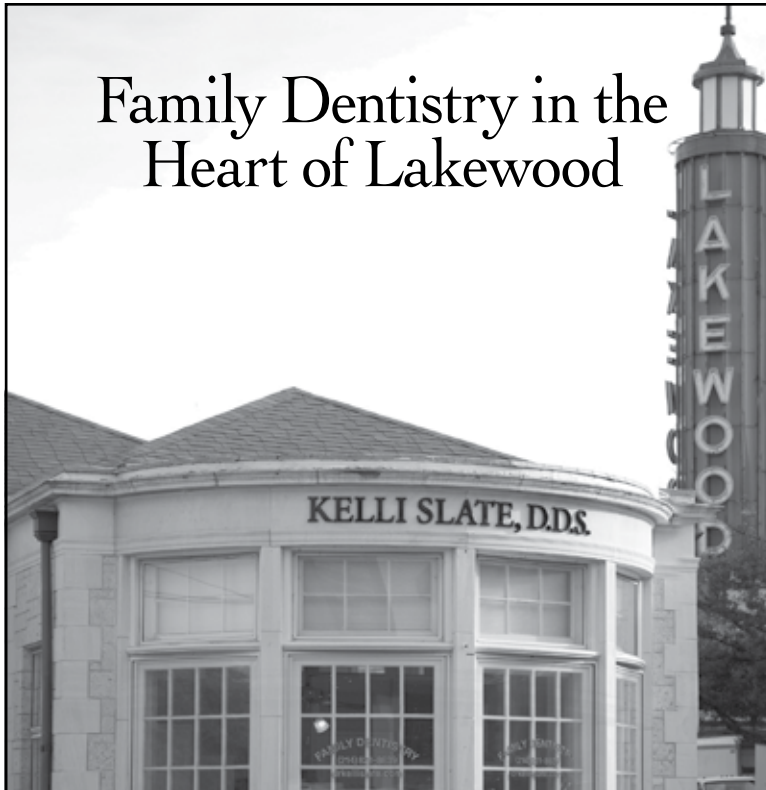

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IMPORTANT NOTE



Allow 3' feet of space on the left and right side of the Roll Cart.

GARBAGE & RECYCLING containers may be placed out at the street curb for collection **no earlier** than 6:00 PM the day before pickup.

Since our pickup is on Fridays, containers may be placed out **AFTER 6:00 PM ON THURSDAY EVENINGS.**

The containers may not be placed in the street, on the sidewalk, or in any manner that will interfere with vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

Garbage and recycling containers must be removed to the side yard or the rear of the structure (no containers in front of houses), preferably out of sight,

BEFORE 8:00 AM THE DAY AFTER COLLECTION DAY

(for us, by 8:00 AM on Saturdays).

BULKY TRASH PICKUP is on the **MONDAY** of third full week.

Violations are punishable by fines between \$50 - \$2000 for the 1st citation, and \$100 - \$2000 for the 2nd in a 24-month period. Anyone can report code violations to 311.

ARTHRITIS IN PETS

Has your cat stopped jumping on the back of the sofa, or has your dog started slowing down on his walks? These can be signs of arthritis or degenerative joint disease. Many joints can be affected, or they can primarily show symptoms from 1 or more joints. It can be genetic, or secondary to an old injury that damaged the joint

Common Symptoms reported:

- Hiding
- Slower on walks
- Hesitating to go up or down stairs
- Cranky when being petted
- Not jumping onto furniture
- Reluctance to come when called
- Stiff gait
- Symptoms often worse in the mornings
- Decreased grooming activity
- Urinating or defecating outside the litterbox

Cats hide their symptoms more than dogs and owners are often unaware of the pain. A majority of cats over the age of 12 have arthritis detectable on x-rays. So, cat families have to pay close attention to notice the changes. Cats often withdraw from families and alter their normally loving natures when they develop joint pain.

Treatment options:

Weight control (obese animals are pre-disposed to arthritis and weight loss can improve pain)

Joint Supplements – variety with variable efficacy. Choices include glucosamine, chondroitin, turmeric, fish oil, MSM, Adequan injections, green lipped mussels. Be wary of the brand making the supplement and ask your veterinarian for advice. Lots of products are sold without good oversight and have poor quality ingredients.

Pain Medications – lots more FDA approved options for dogs than cats. There are some off label long term therapies for cats that can be discussed with your veterinarian. Different classes of medications are used either alone or in combination including non-steroidal anti-inflammatory medications, nerve pain medication, as well as opioid medicines.

With a little help, we can reduce the pain of arthritis associated with aging for your furry family member.

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EXPANDED NEIGHBORHOOD PATROL (ENP) UPDATE

Crime Statistics

Our neighborhood reported crime events continues to be low, thank you to our ENP Officers for the continued patrol and presence. This year with our membership of 220 households we were able to have 16 hours a week of dedicated patrol in our neighborhood. I hope this new year brings us new members so we can continue to expand our coverage to keep our crime rate low.

Our ENP Officers are also part of the Dallas Neighborhood Patrol Team for the Central Division in Dallas. The Neighborhood Patrol Team is a specialized group designed to be a liaison between the Police Department and the community. The team assists in starting community Crime Watch groups, attends Crime Watch and Homeowner's Association meetings, participates in community events and functions, assists in the resolution of community concerns, and conducts special projects and operations. Your Neighborhood Police officers are here to help you take back your community as well as establish and maintain a positive relationship with the Police Department. If you participated in the recent HSMNA Neighborhood Night Out November 18th you had the opportunity to meet our ENP and Neighborhood Patrol Team.

December 5th the Neighborhood Patrol Team worked together to clean up one of our neighbor's yards. This is the second year in a row for this activity and they put in some effort as you can see.



Benefits of membership in HSMNA ENP:

- Surveillance of your home when you are out of town
- Surveillance of construction when your home is being remodeled
- ENP officers are available for a security review of your property and can provide tips to make it safer
- Email to ENP officers
- Faster response times to 911 calls when officer on duty

- Professional criminals and vandalism/malicious mischief will be deterred
- Reckless/speeding drivers will be better monitored
- Illegal door-to-door solicitation/handbills will be reduced
- More surveillance of Lindsley Park, Santa Fe Trail and the neighborhood schools

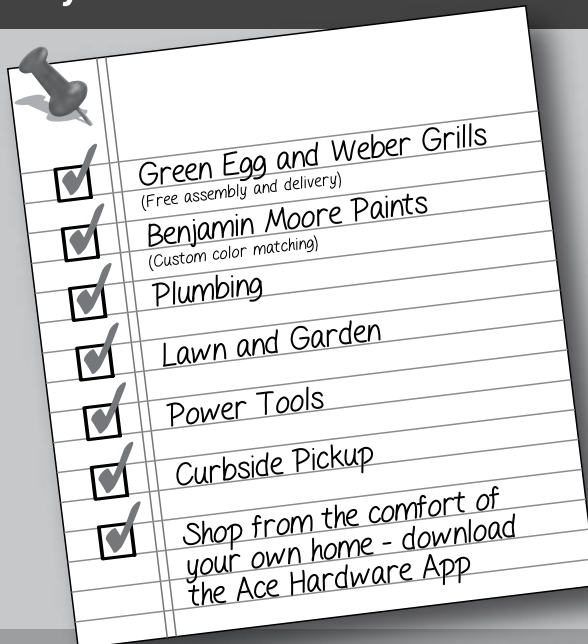

HOLLYWOOD/SANTA MONICA IS A CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Ordinance No. 21608 Adopted March 9, 1993.

ANY construction or remodeling of the outside of your
home requires a Conservation District Work Review
Form from the City of Dallas. This form is in addition
to any other permits (such as building permits)
required by the city.

GET YOUR CONSERVATION DISTRICT WORK REVIEW FORM *BEFORE* YOU BEGIN EXTERIOR REMODELING, REPAIRING, OR IMPROVEMENTS TO YOUR HOME.

In a Conservation District, the guidelines are city
law, and violations result in the city enforcing the
Conservation District Ordinance with work stoppage
or fines. You can download a copy of the ordinance on
our website at www.hsmna.org. The process to obtain
a Conservation District Work Review Form is painless
and can be done by mail. Before you begin work on the
outside of your house, send a detailed description of
what you plan to do with photos of the existing area
and sketches of your proposal to:

TOP TEN RESTRICTED LIST:

1. Improper Porch Enclosures
2. Painting of Exterior Brick Veneer
and Paint Colors
3. Installation of Skylights
4. Asphalt, Gravel, or Circular
Driveways
5. Front/Side Yard Fence Height and
Required Setback
6. Carports not in Backyard
7. Removal of Original Stained Glass
8. Metal Roof Materials
9. Window and Door Replacement
10. Retaining Walls

The documentation listed below must be submitted with a completed Conservation District Work Review Form Application. By checking each requirement you are stating that you have supplied correct and complete information. In the event that the required information is not contained in the submitted documents, you will be notified. Failure to supply the requested information will result in the review of your application being delayed.

REMODELING/ADDITIONS AND NEW CONSTRUCTION

TWO Sets of plan drawings including:

- **Elevations.** (labeled north, south, east, & west as applicable) and plan drawings to scale indicating proposed alterations or additions, clearly delineating existing and proposed work. Note: until further notice, an 11" by 17" set of plans must be provided in addition to the full-sets.
- **Site plan.** Provide a site plan that shows the location and dimensions of any additions and/or new construction and all setbacks.
- **Survey.** Provide a copy of the survey of the lot that shows: 1) dimensions of lot, 2) location and dimensions of existing structures; and 3) all setbacks.
- **Photographs.** Provide photographs of house and/or other structures on property where work is to be done. Photos should clearly show existing conditions (where work is proposed) from all relevant sides.
- **Grading plan.** If the existing slope of the lot is being altered, provide a grading plan.
- A scalable detail drawing of the proposed foundation at a min. scale of 1/2-inch = 1-foot. Foundation detail should indicate location of finished grade.

- Indicate on elevations if window openings will be enlarged or reduced in size



ROOFING (Work Review Form must specify):

- Type of roofing material on the structure currently. (e.g., clay tile, comp. shingles)
- Proposed roofing material (e.g., clay tile, comp. shingles)
- Brand name of proposed roofing material and the color (e.g., GAF, Timberline in Weathered Wood)



PAINTING

- Paint color chip required. Color chip should show brand, color number and name (e.g., Sherwin-Williams. SW 6359, Beige).



POOLS/SPAS

- A section through the length and the width of the pool/spa showing the height (in inches) above grade for any element of the pool and/or spa above grade.
- An 8.5 by 11 color image of how the finished pool/spa will look.



FENCES

- A property survey clearly showing the locations of existing/proposed fencing, existing/proposed materials and existing/proposed fence heights.

NOTE: Submittal requirements for fences may vary according to Conservation District regulations additional drawings and information may be required to complete project review.

NOTE: Minimum scale of 1/8"=1'0" on all plans and elevations, unless otherwise approved by a Conservation District Planner. Plans should not be reduced and must be to scale to verify measurements. Section and/or detail drawings if required should have a minimum scale of 1/2" =1'.

WINDOWS

- Photographs of all windows to be replaced.
- Manufacturers' image(s) of proposed new windows. Image should clearly show the dimensions of the windows, the number of lites/divisions, whether muntins are expressed outside of the glass, window material and window types (double hung, casement, etc.)

Thanks to our Council Member David Blewett and Amanda Shultz - District 14 Dallas Park and Recreation Board, our beloved Lindsley Park will be undergoing some major renovations that will be ready by Spring 2021. Improvements that total \$120,000.00, include replacing the existing playground installed in 1993 by the HSMNA with brand new all abilities playground equipment, sidewalk repairs and permanent restroom facilities. Pavilion, perimeter and interior park lighting will be upgraded to state-of-the-art LED fixtures that minimize glare while reducing light trespass and skyglow so not to impact adjacent neighbors.

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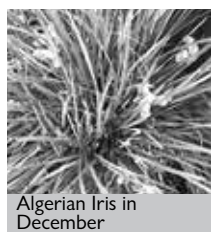

AUTUMN LANDSCAPING IN THE TRIANGLES AND HSM

This year the LC and other volunteers spent several half-days decorating two triangles and the Monument. For the first time, battery-operated lights were ordered and placed on lamp posts at the Mistletoe and upper San Mateo triangles. Thank you, John Lill, for the battery-powered lights and their installation. With some outlets and multiple strings not working at the Monument, replacement light strings are on order for the ten or so strings not working at the Monument. A hard freeze (28 and under) has not yet happened HSM, leaving some perennials and a “Yellow Roses of Texas” blooming in the triangles to complement the decorations.

Though spring is often anticipated as the primary gardening season, a well-planned garden in our mild humid subtropical climate can be as beautiful in fall and winter as in the spring. In my own garden, Algerian iris, red cyclamen, and “Autumn Embers” azaleas complement the red leaves of winged euonymus (dwarf burning bush), the orange and scarlet foliage of the native smooth sumac, and the native deciduous winterberry holly’s red berries.

Although found growing on roadsides, sumac and winterberry rarely are included in anyone’s list of “xeriscape” plantings.

Also rarely planted is the perfectly adapted, monkey grass-like Algerian iris from North Africa that begins its insistent flowering in November, stops in late March, and pauses its profuse flowering for a few days only after the hardest freeze.

This the beginning of the time to just enjoy the HSM gardens, with the one exception of minor pruning

and removing of suckers, cross-cutting limbs, and shrub limbs under 13 feet sticking out into the street. The LC has accordingly performed these long-neglected tasks at the triangles while decorating.

Since the ground does not freeze in Dallas, fall is an opportunity to get a head start planting so roots get established before the stressful onslaught of the Texas summer. The LC used this opportunity to plant a section of the Mistletoe Triangle as a children’s hummingbird, butterfly, and pollinator area, so children walking by can observe the beauty of nature. Thanks to Ricky Girson of the LC for the concept and design.

The peace of autumn is too often marred by the loud nasal whine of leaf blowers. What ever happened to the rake? Consider using a mulching mower to turn the leaves into grass fertilizer on site, following nature’s creation of humus, rather than applying chemical fertilizers in the spring. My neighbor uses chemical fertilizers, I use mulched leaves, and our grass looks the same in the summer!

Where leaves have accumulated in beds, mulch can be applied over the leaves when the leaf fall ends, supplementing the natural leaf humus, but leave the flares of all trees and shrubs exposed. With rare exceptions such as elm leaves that can mat, leaves benefit your garden. If you become overwhelmed with too many leaves, think about accumulating – or blowing – your leaves into a compost pile so they reduce over time into a manageable volume of good compost for lawn and flower beds. Leaves are more beneficial in your garden than in the landfill, storm sewers, or blowing down the street.

homeowners themselves. In fact, all the plants except the large pecan and the cedar elm were part of Roth’s plan. Working with a landscape architect to personalize an overall design, then implementing it over time as money permits, is a money-saving idea. Otherwise, the cost of impulsive plant purchases, mistakes, plant unsuitability and other landscape stops and starts will mount up over time.

“naturalistic” landscape that would be overpowered by the angularity of the two-story front façade. They have chosen to establish ground cover rather than undertaking the risky work of mowing the steep slope just above the sidewalk.

This house one of the few two-story houses in HSM and is our single example of the Monterrey Style of the Eclectic Era, from which most HSM houses date. The overhanging second-story balcony typifies this style, of which a few examples can also be found in Lakewood.

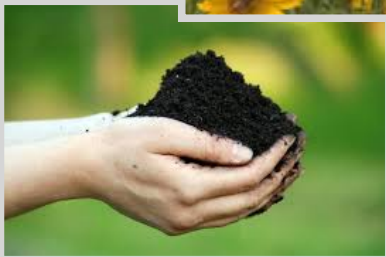
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THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP NATIVE INSECTS AND BIRDS IN WINTERTIME:



Incorporate native plants into your landscape. They require less water and provide better nourishment to insects and butterflies.

Cutting stems too early disrupts crucial parts of the natural cycle. Spent flower heads provide seeds for winter birds who are looking for standing stems. Dormant plants provide shelter for ground dwellers and nesting material for birds. Native bees, moths, spiders, and beetles are some that rely on hollow stems from standing plants as places to hibernate or lay eggs.



Tilling soil destroys soil structure and promotes erosion. Naturally occurring air pockets are necessary for healthy roots and water absorption.



Leave the leaves! Swallowtail butterflies and luna moths disguise their chrysalis and cocoons as dried leaves. Queen bumblebees burrow 1-2" underground relying on leaf cover to keep them warm.

Invite wildlife to your yard with sources of food (nectar), water, cover (a pile of logs), and places to raise their young. Use sustainable practices.
